Spotlight on Aboriginal issues:

Wednesday April 29 marked the 250th Anniversary of the first encounter of our local Indigenous peoples with Lt. James Cook and his crew on the Endeavour. This encounter was the most consequential for the First Peoples of Australia because it was



the beginning of a fundamental change to their way of life. The anniversary is an opportunity to reflect on the lasting impact this event has had on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

The first day of May is used annually to acknowledge the massacre of between 60 and 300 Aboriginal people at Slaughterhouse Creek (Waterloo Creek) in NSW. This massacre was carried out over a series of months in 1837 and 1838 by mounted police and colonial civilians in retaliation for attacks on farms and the killing of up to five farmers. The most significant toll on human life occurred during December 1837 and January 1838 with reports of over one hundred Aboriginal people being killed on January 26. Let this day be an opportunity to acknowledge and reconcile the past.

At 6:00am on Saturday morning Dave and I stood in our driveway with a candle, a photo of my Dad and with our neighbours we listened to the ANZAC Day broadcast. Across the road we could see others standing with their children... All over Australia that same scene was being played out - a far cry from the ANZAC Day marches I remember going to as a little girl. For me ANZAC Day has always been a special day to

remember my Dad – an ordinary soldier who, although he didn't win any medals, he was such a brave person. When he joined the Army in 1939, his two older brothers and two sisters had already joined up. Dad put up his age so that his Mum didn't have to sign his enlistment forms. He told me he didn't want her to carry that burden... "If anything happened to me, I didn't want Mum to feel responsible." Yet, the significance of ANZAC Day is surely more than remembering my Dad and all those who've served. For me the Day is about my deep wish that everyone can live in peace, in a just and free world. ... Surely this must be what it's all about?

Mother of God and our Mother, pray for us to God, the Father of mercies, that this great suffering may end and that hope and peace may dawn anew. Plead with your divine Son, as you did at Cana, so that the families of the sick and the victims be comforted, and their hearts be opened to confidence and trust.

Protect those doctors, nurses, health workers and volunteers who are on the frontline of this emergency, and are risking their lives to save others. Support their heroic effort and grant them strength, generosity and continued health.

Be close to those who assist the sick night and day, and to priests who, in their pastoral concern and fidelity to the Gospel, are trying to help and support everyone.

Blessed Virgin, illumine the minds of men and women engaged in scientific research, that they may find effective solutions to overcome this virus.

Support national leaders, that with wisdom, solicitude and generosity they may come to the aid of those lacking the basic necessities of life and may devise social and economic solutions inspired by farsightedness and solidarity.

Mary Most Holy, stir our consciences, so that the enormous funds invested in developing and stockpiling arms will instead be spent on promoting effective research on how to prevent similar tragedies from occurring in the future.

Beloved Mother, help us realize that we are all members of one great family and to recognize the bond that unites us, so that, in a spirit of fraternity and solidarity, we can help to alleviate countless situations of poverty and need. Make us strong in faith, persevering in service, constant in prayer.

Mary, Consolation of the afflicted, embrace all your children in distress and pray that God will stretch out his all-powerful hand and free us from this terrible pandemic, so that life can serenely resume its normal course.

To you, who shine on our journey as a sign of salvation and hope, do we entrust ourselves, O Clement, O Loving, O Sweet Virgin Mary. Amen.

5. For those places where war and violence and religious persecution continues, that responding to the appeal of the General Secretary of the United Nations, Pope Francis and other religious leaders, there may be a cease fire in every place, giving hope for peace. *(Pause 1, 2, 3) Lord hear us*
