Livestreaming of Parish Masses

Viewing numbers across the archdiocese with those streaming Masses are continuing to increase which is great. More than one million people across the country watched the Good Friday and Easter Sunday services live from St Mary's Cathedral last weekend on Channel 7.

The Passion of Our Lord on Good Friday reached 545,000 broadcast viewers with an additional 86,000 live-streaming and social media viewers reaching a total audience of 631,000, 42.4 per cent of the available audience. The Easter Sunday 10.30am Mass reached a whopping 568,000 broadcast viewers with a further 113,000 live-streaming and social media viewers reaching a total of 681,000 viewers – attracting a 46.3 per cent audience share.

Overwhelmingly, the audiences were highest in the Sydney metropolitan area, followed by NSW, the ACT, Western Australia and Queensland.

Supporting the Jesuit Refugee Services (JRS)

COVID-19 is creating an avalanche of need on the ground for people seeking asylum. Katie Spiroski, JRS Caseworker Manager, writes that, "More people are in crisis than ever before. Calls to our casework service have doubled in the space of two weeks. There are more than 100 families and individuals on our waiting-lists running out of food, rent, or money for medical payments. 90% of JRS' caseworker phone calls with clients involve discussions about homelessness and hopelessness. 80% contain suicidal ideations..."

Foodbank stocks urgently needed: Basmati rice, cooking oil, long life milk, tinned tuna, red kidney beans, lentils, chick peas, shampoo, toothpaste and toothbrushes, sanitary pads, soap, napkins ...

Spotlight on Aboriginal issues: An Acknowledgement of Country to reflect on....

As we do this, we must also acknowledge the loss of their hunting grounds, the destruction of their ceremonial places and sacred sites, and the great loss of life from all kinds of violence and disease, and that the land was never given away. Why not include everyone?

JobSeeker legislation passed last week provides support to 6 million workers and families. It is the biggest support package in Australian history and can be seen as a win for civil society who campaigned through business leaders, community groups and unions to achieve this. However, more than 2 million workers in casual work or on temporary visas (including overseas students, people seeking asylum and refugees) remain excluded. The campaign to include them in either JobKeeper and JobSeeker must continue! It's not too late because the legislation gives the Treasurer broad discretion to change the eligibility for JobKeeper payments without the need to recall parliament. Can you contact the Treasurer and /or The Finance Minister to voice your concerns?
