The Archdiocese of Sydney recognises that staying safe online is something many adults, children and young people are concerned about. Technology is changing now more than ever, it is important that we can remain aware of potential online challenges and equip ourselves with the tools we need to protect not only ourselves online but children and young people. In light of the current situation, more research has been conducted about the risks and challenges that children and young peo-

ple face online, according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics, ninety-seven per cent of households with children aged under 15 years have access to the internet, with an average number of seven devices per household, ninety-nine per cent of young people aged 15 - 17 years are online averaging 18 hours per week of online activity.

The Safeguarding Office wants to develop resources that will provide adults, children and young people with the knowledge and skills to help keep them safe online. We are turning towards our parish communities for help to roll out this great initiative, we have developed a **5 minute CyberSafety Survey for adults and children to complete** that will enable us to gain a better understanding about the knowledge adults, children and young people have about eSafety as well as develop resources that are targeted the needs of our Archdiocese community.

The survey is anonymous and **will only take 5 minutes to complete, very quick and easy. We are encouraging as many people as possible to get involved, you don't have to have children in order to participate in the survey.** The questions have been designed to be fun and gauge an individuals basic understanding of eSafety. Supporting the Jesuit Refugee Services (JRS)

Last Tuesday Fay and I delivered baby goods to the JRS centre at Westmead. It was heartening to see there the amount of support for people seeking asylum and refugees, the group that is perhaps doing it toughest at this time. We saw food donations being dropped off by the Inner West Council bus. We saw food parcels lining the passageways. We saw volunteer delivery drivers loading the food parcels into their cars. Craig Foster, prominent refugee advocate, SBS sports personality and former Socceroo, helped unload our vehicle.

At a time when government support for people seeking asylum is minimal or non-existent, it was great to see that we at St Columba's are part of the community support for our less fortunate brothers and sisters.

Foodbank stocks urgently needed: Basmati rice,



cooking oil, long life milk, tinned tuna, red m kidney beans, lentils, chick peas, canned tomatoes, oats and cereal, and toiletry items such as soap and toothpaste.

Please leave donations at the Parish Office on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday 10:00am - 2:00pm. One of our team will make sure they get to the JRS Centre at Westmead.

We know it's hard to shop at the moment, so **cash** donations might be easier.

Spotlight on Aboriginal issues:

With this upcoming week being significant for Indigenous Issues, we thought we would have a more detailed look at National Sorry Day, which is to be held on May 26th. National Sorry Day is a day that commemorates the loss and suffering endured by the Australian Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children whom were separated from their families. May 26,1998 was exactly one year after the Bringing Them Home Report was tabled in the Federal Parliament. This report investigated and exposed the injustices encountered by the stolen generations and set a path towards reconciliation between the broader Australian community and its Indigenous citizens. We weigh ourselves down with things, and they can become a load for us to carry. Yet we know that the more lightly we walk on this earth, the more she gives to us. Thomas Merton prayed for the gift of insight, such that...everything I touch is turned into a prayer; where the sky is my prayer, the birds are my prayer, the wind in the trees is my

prayer, for God is all in all.

And as St Mary MacKillop once wrote: *Living in a simple* humble way, we want for nothing.
