A reflection from Anne-Marie

"I have had the privilege to be able to volunteer for the JRS as a delivery/collection driver. I have witnessed where all the generous donations in kind, of food and other essentials end up.

The number of people who required assistance has grown exponentially since I started a couple of months ago. The reward for me are the smiles on the faces and the graciousness of the people when I deliver what most of us would consider a small shopping bag. This small bag is for families as big as 5 with young children and adults. These are ordinary people trying to live an ordinary life in a world that has been turned upside. The saddest part of this 'job' is the places to which I have to deliver, while scouring for an address it is inevitably in the worse location, in the worse street, in the worse building often with 'For Lease ' sign attached, no doubt a reminder or heralding the potential for eviction."



Refugee Week

The theme of the recent Refugee Week was "A Year of Welcome". With this in mind, last week we took part in the JRS Webinar, Between Welcome and Exclusion – Australia and the Politics of Asylum during COVID-19. What does welcome mean to you? To me welcome is intrinsically tied in to gospel values; it means kindness, hospitality, sharing, acceptance...When we deliver donations to Westmead, and see the food packages made up ready to be delivered, what you can't help but notice is the generosity of so many individuals, parishes and organisations. That stands in stark contrast to Federal government policy which seems determined to punish and make life hard for people seeking asylum.

Spotlight on Aboriginal Issues: Closing the gap

Closing the gap between Indigenous and non-indigenous Australians has been a goal and focus of the Australian Government for the past couple of decades. Achieving this however has been more than difficult. According to

Between 2014-2016, Indigenous children aged 0-4 were more than twice as likely to die than non-Indigenous children. In the Northern Territory, Indigenous infant mortality was 4 times higher than the national rate.

From birth, Indigenous Australians have a lower life expectancy than non-Indigenous Australians:

Non-Indigenous girls born in 2010-2012 in Australia can expect to live a decade longer than Indigenous girls born the same year (84.3 years and 73.7 years respectively).

The gap for men is even larger, with a 69.1 years life expectancy for Indigenous men and 79.9 years for non-Indigenous men.

Indigenous women also experience approximately double the level of maternal mortality in 2016.

Similar gaps exist in areas of education and employment, physical and mental health, incarceration, and family and community wellbeing. 
Understanding change, loss and grief brought about by COVID-19
