

The Tampa

Wednesday 26 August marks the 19th anniversary of the rescue of 433 asylum seekers by the MV Tampa. This incident, along with the Children Overboard affair, marks the time when our treatment of people seeking asylum changed for the worse. And so, here we are today with a border protection policy that ignores basic human rights, ignores international treaties, and demonises people seeking asylum as

illegals, as law breakers. It's a policy that has managed to wedge our society ... a policy built on outright fear and prejudice. It's a policy that now sees temporary visa holders destitute and relying on charities such as Jesuit Refugee Service and Asylum Seeker Resource Centre for basic needs of food and shelter. And people seeking asylum are among the groups that our Federal government are ignoring when it comes to COVID-19 welfare support.

To Live Life to the Full: Mental Health in Australia today, the latest Catholic Bishops Social Justice Statement.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Statement is a timely reminder for us to better support one another and break down the stigma associated with mental health. The Statement highlights the experiences of those who are vulnerable, such as First Nations people, those who are homeless, those who have been



imprisoned, and not least, refugees and people seeking asylum. It calls on us to advocate for policies and services to meet their needs - "we're all in this together"

Spotlight on Aboriginal Issues: Senator Bonner

August 17th marked the 49th anniversary of the swearing-in of Senator Neville Bonner - the first Aboriginal Australian to hold a seat in Federal Parliament.

Since 1971, there have been six other Indigenous parliamentarians elected to the Federal Parliament of Australia. The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population of Australia is currently at about 3.3% of the national population. It is important for all sectors of the Australian population to be represented through our country's democratic system. With the growing inequality gap across Australia and its disproportional impact upon our Aboriginal citizens, having representation across all levels of government has never been more important. Raise the Rate for Good

To date, the Federal government has not committed to making long-term increases in JobSeeker payments (formally Newstart). Instead, from September, the Coronavirus Supplement will drop from \$550 per fortnight to \$250 a fortnight – meaning all those people on JobSeeker will have around \$57 a day to live on! At this stage there is no commitment to extend the Supplement beyond this year.

We invite you to join with Vinnies and advocate for a fair and adequate payment.


