Social Justice - St Columba's

The Season of Creation: 1 September - 4 October. In previous bulletins we've talked about Laudato Si highlighting the intrinsic beauty of nature and the connectedness of every living thing. There's another side of Laudato Si - it includes a call to action which involves for many of us a change of heart, a change of attitude....AN ECOLOGICAL CONVERSION. We're challenged to reduce our consumption, avoid waste and recycle wherever we can. We're challenged to change our thinking and see ourselves as part of creation, not as its master. We need to see the inherent beauty of every living person too – and ensure that everyone is respected and treated in a just and fair way, especially the marginalised. Laudato Si, then, is in fact a call for each and every one of us to change how we act and how we think!

Catholic Earthcare Australia: Convocation 2020.

This series of webinars continues through September. It covers, from a Catholic perspective, our relationship with our common home. This week the Convocation concentrated on the Catholic social justice principles that should underpin our economy, and in particular the kind of economy that should be emerging post-COVID-19. Fr Bruce Duncan stressed the fact that the economy these days works for the richest 1% and not for the vast majority. He referred repeatedly to the 2017/18 Bishops' Statement *Everyone*⁸s *Business*, which calls for an economy that works for all of us. In relation to the economic recovery from COVID-19, he was adamant that JobSeeker and JobKeeper needed to be kept going as long as possible, and that the economy needed to be stimulated by many infrastructure projects, especially public housing construction.

Louise Bradshaw and Michael Block from Australian Catholic Superannuation and Retirement Fund reminded us that superannuation is a form of social justice in that it allows everyone to aspire to a retirement where their basic needs are met. They spoke about the importance of ESG principles (Environmental, Social, Governance) in investment strategies. Moreover, they emphasised that it was the responsibility of us all to ensure that the businesses we support, and not just financial institutions, operate in an honest, ethical and just manner. If these businesses do not do so, we should "vote with our feet" and take our money to those that do.

Supporting the Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS) Thank you everyone, for your generosity in helping people seeking asylum by supporting JRS. Our donations mean a lot. In particular, our parishes



response to the call out for blankets needs mentioning. There is a parishioner who thoughtfully chose colourful blankets to donate in order to brighten up lives of the recipients, there's the blankets that come individually wrapped with ribbon, there's the car load of blankets from a parishioner's workplace. 
Aboriginal and Islander culture has been in place for over 60,000 years in Australia and is the oldest surviving culture in the world. This was not a singular 'culture' since each language group had different environments and differing kinship systems, dreamtime stories and spiritual beliefs. There were, however, constant threads throughout including the concept of a creator spirit that looked after, provided for, and watched over everyone. There was belief and faith in an Ancestor Spirit on whom they relied for all their needs. He was their Protector, Provider, Carer and Saviour. His name was honoured.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders are a spiritual people, a people who are aware of the spiritual reality of the land and of their own lives.

When early Christian Ministries introduced the Bible to Aboriginal people, the Elders recognised many similarities between the Old Testament stories and traditional stories, laws and the teachings of God (or a Creator Spirit). Traditional culture uses stories to teach about sharing, caring for each other and the land and providing moral guidance. The stories throughout the Bible serve this same, exact purpose...
