COVID RESTRICTIONS:

Masks are not mandatory in places of worship however you are welcome to still wear one if you prefer.

We ask that you still only sit in pews that are labelled, for social distancing and also makes it easier for wipe down between Masses. We will continue with QR scanning before entry to St Columba's, no need to pre-register with google form.

From the Justice and Peace Office...

"This week we a have one small piece of good news. Over the last few weeks dozens of people who were seeking asylum (brought here under the now repealed "Medevac" legislation) and were held in hotel detention have been released into the community. While their release is long overdue, they have only been given six-month temporary visas despite many of them being recognised as refugees. Without adequate government support, they and the many other thousands of people already in Australia seeking protection will have to rely on assistance from organisations like the Jesuit Refugee Service and the House of Welcome, so any support you can give those organisations will be very welcome."

Anti - slavery ... some steps we can take

Following on from our observance of the feast day of St Bakhita, patron saint of the anti-slavery movement, over the next few weeks we'll present some ideas of what we as consumers might be able to do to combat modern slavery.

Let's look at Fashion...

From raw materials to manufacturing, exploitation and slavery is rife in global supply chains. Stopping slavery in supply chains requires a global response – from corporates, governments, civil society – AND US! As consumers, our role is vital in creating change.

How to be an ethical fashion consumer (From Baptist World Aid Australia: "The COVID Fashion Guide"

Next time you're about to make a purchase, stop and think. Ask yourself:

1. What is my reason for buying?

- \Rightarrow Is it necessary?
- \Rightarrow How often will I wear it?
- \Rightarrow Is it likely to be in style next year?
- 2. What is the human impact of my purchase? So many people are involved in the supply chains that bring us the garments we buy.

Our shopping decisions matter. As consumers, together we can have real impact. Let's choose and reward fashion brands that try to do the right thing! Check out the *Baptist World Aid Ethical Fashion Guide* and/or the *Good on You* app to help you decide which fashion brands you're likely to buy from, and the ones you won't be buying from.

3. What is the environmental impact of my purchase? We should also think about the environmental implications related to the production of our garments. Before a garment came to your wardrobe, what was the environmental impact of its production? When you no longer wear it, what are the likely impacts of its disposal? According to the ABC's War on Waste, Australians send 6 TONNES of discarded clothing to landfill every 10 MINUTES. That's huge!

Having a slave – free world might seem impossible, but these words from Archbishop Desmond Tutu give courage and hope:

"Do your little bit of good where you are...It is those little bits of good put together that overwhelm the world."

Spotlight on Aboriginal Issues: February 13th, Anniversary of the Stolen Generation Apology

On Saturday, February 13, 2008 Kevin Rudd gave an official Apology to the Stolen Generation in the Commonwealth Parliament.

The Apology acknowledged the ongoing trauma and suffering caused by the forcible separation of many Indigenous children from their families as a result of government policies 1910-1970.

The Apology was also a plea for unity and reconciliation. "...The time has now come for the nation to turn a new page in Australia's history by righting the wrongs of the past and so moving forward with confidence to the future" (From the Apology)

"God of justice and forgiveness, guide us as we continue on pathways to Reconciliation. Grant us the courage to speak out against the injustices of our Indigenous brothers and sisters continue to suffer. Help us to see with new eyes, to listen to the stories of our Indigenous brothers and sisters and to feel with a heart of compassion..." (NATSICC Liturgy for Reconciliation).
