From Fr Peter's Desk...

CATECHESIS About Liturgy

Lenten environment:

Many of us have it in our Catholic imagination that Lent is about the desert. One reason for this is today's gospel reading, which, on the First Sunday of Lent, is always about Jesus' temptation in the desert. But beyond that reference, nothing else about Lent implies desert or dryness, much less cacti or sand.

The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy says that Lent has a twofold nature: "[By] the recalling of Baptism or the preparation for it, and Penance ... the church prepares the faithful for the celebration of Easter, while they listen more attentively to God's word and devote more time to prayer. Accordingly ... more use is to be made of the baptismal features which are part of the Lenten liturgy" (109). Join this directive with today's first reading about Noah and the flood and the second reading connecting that flood with the saving waters of baptism, and we get something that looks a lot more like spring with its thunderstorms and new buds bending under the weight of that water.

That image of new life in need of extra care from sudden storms is what this First Sunday of Lent is about as the church makes a covenant with its most vulnerable-the elect. The promise we give them is that they too will be saved, like Noah, by the flood of God's grace in the waters of baptism at the upcoming Easter Vigil. We, the church, will be their ark of safety during these last few weeks of temptation, doubt, and second thoughts.

We who are baptized are to be examples for these elect of ongoing conversion and renewal, of repentance and deeper commitment to living out the vows of our baptism. This is why we must make more use of the baptismal features that are proper to the Lenten liturgy in order to help us remember our own baptismal vows for the sake of those who are preparing to make those vows for the first time. Therefore, get rid of the sand and cacti. Make sure all your fonts are overflowing with water. Preach about baptism and what it means to live as baptized people who face daily temptations with the courage and faith of Jesus.

Anti - slavery ... some steps we can take

Continuing our series of articles about modern day slavery and what we can do to combat it, this week we will concentrate on **chocolate**. Given the time of year, it's a product you're likely to have bought recently (Valentine's Day) or will soon, with Easter coming up.

Did you know?

- Chocolate is made from cocoa beans.
- Most cocoa is produced in West Africa under harsh conditions. These conditions lead to the use of child and forced labour, and to gender inequality and deforestation.
- According to Fairtrade Australia/New Zealand, about 50 million people worldwide depend on the sector for their livelihoods, and only about 10% of farmers receive a fair price for their product.

What can we do as consumers to change this situation? An effective way to support cocoa farmers is by purchasing



chocolate that carries the Fairtrade symbol. Often it might cost a little more to do so but it helps those much less fortunate than ourselves.

Companies may not use the Fairtrade symbol unless they meet a set of stringent criteria. The symbol means that farmers get a minimum price for their crops that is both secure and stable. It also means they get an extra payment that goes towards education of their children, investment in their business, and other appropriate needs.

Fairtrade chocolate can be found in many outlets, including the major supermarket chains. Many companies carry the

Spotlight on Aboriginal Issues: 2021 Senior Australian of the Year

Congratulations Dr Miriam-Rose Ungunmerrr Baumann AM: 2021 Senior Australian of the Year

Dr Miriam-Rose Ungunmerr Baumann AM is an Aboriginal elder from Nauiyu and a renowned artist, activist, writer and public speaker.

In 1975, Miriam-Rose became the Territory's first fully qualified Aboriginal teacher. As an art consultant for the Department of Education, she visited schools through the Top End, advocating for the inclusion of visual art as part of every child's education.

Miriam-Rose later became the principal of the Catholic school in her home community before being appointed to the Federal Government's advisory body, the National Indigenous Council.

In 2013, she established the Miriam Rose Foundation, to bridge the divide between Aboriginal culture and mainstream society - driving reconciliation at a grassroots level.

Through her professional and creative life, Miriam-Rose has remained dedicated to maintaining the cultural independence of her people and being a spokesperson for the Aboriginal worldview. In recognition of her leadership, she was awarded a Member of the Order of Australia medal and an Honorary PhD in Education from Charles Darwin University. Source: australianoftheyear.org.au

From the St Vinnies Social Justice January Newsletter ...

The St Vincent de Paul Society is deeply concerned about people currently on JobSeeker who are still locked out of employment. They face the prospect of returning to live on \$40 a day just six weeks from now, at the end of March.

In recent years approximately one third of people assisted by the Society in NSW have been JobSeeker recipients: Every day our members saw how the old rate of pay forced people to choose between essentials such as putting food on the table, paying bills, or accessing vital healthcare.

As the Federal Government considers the future of JobSeeker it is critical that they hear directly from their constituents about the importance of payments that act as a true safety net, allowing everyone to afford the basics, including housing.




