From Fr Peter's Desk....

CATECHESIS About Liturgy

Rejoicing and mourning: So much of our Scriptures, especially the psalms, speak of human emotion and run the whole gamut from exultant rejoicing to resigned grief. On this Laetare (or "rejoice") Sunday, we have similar contrasts. We get the name for this Sunday from the entrance antiphon: "Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. / Be joyful, all who were in mourning; / exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast" (Is. 66:10-11). Like Gaudete Sunday in Advent, this midpoint to the Lenten penitential season gives us a little breather. We are halfway through our Lenten observance! Therefore, the rubrics in the Mass call for rose or violet vestments, and instrumental music as well as flowers at the altar may be used on this day.

However, Psalm 137 assigned for today stands in stark contrast to this mid-season rejoicing: "Let my tongue be silenced, if I ever forget you! / By the streams of Babylon / we sat and wept when we remembered Zion." What do we make of these extremes in emotion, and how does it inform our liturgical preparation? Is liturgy about feelings, and are liturgists meant to direct an assembly's emotions? Our faith is wonderfully incarnational and human, and we teach that in Jesus' incarnation, all human feeling and experience is transformed by his divinity. Yet, the liturgy itself is dispassionate, not because it is devoid of emotion but because it is rooted in the constancy of God who, out of passionate love for humankind, "gave his only Son, I so that everyone who believes in him might not perish I but might have eternal life." Gabe Huck said it well when he wrote about liturgy and feelings:

Liturgy is not about how we feel. It is about who we are and whose we are. Much is made today of feelings and of the individual's great importance. When Christians enter upon their liturgy, however, all of that must be balanced with something else. The liturgy is what the church does. If I do the liturgy, I do it as a baptized member of this community of baptized persons. In a sense, I play a role that is only partly mine now, the role of a member of God's reign. The liturgy does not exist so that I can get my feelings expressed. Rather, it rehearses me in the feelings I ought to have ... We can begin to glimpse how the liturgy is filled not simply with

We can begin to glimpse how the liturgy is filled not simply with emotion but with passion. Look at the words we sing in the psalms and hear in the scripture, look at the lives we celebrate on feasts, look hardest at the very core of the Eucharist. In the Eucharistic Prayer we speak as passionate people about creation and sin and God's relentless love. The climax of Catholic liturgy is the eating and drinking of Christ's body and blood, a deed that holds and little by little reveals a multitude of human passions. Bernard Collaery and Witness K

We haven't raised the issue of the prosecution of Bernard Collaery and Witness K for a while. But the case goes on...and on. You might remember that it involves these two men being pursued by the Federal Government for revealing the unlawful bugging of the Timor-Leste Government's cabinet room to advantage the Australian side during negotiations about the Timor Sea boundary. The ultimate beneficiary of this was Woodside Petroleum.

The reason we're revisiting this issue now is because Attorney-General Christian Porter is invoking the "rule of law" in his response to the rape allegation made against him. Yet Porter has ignored the rule of law in his treatment of Collaery and Witness K. (Note that what follows is based on an article in John Menadue's blog, *Pearls and Irritations*).

In prosecuting these two men, Porter has:

- Drawn the case out over several years in an attempt to put pressure on Collaery's financial resources, if not bankrupt him entirely. Three separate judges have criticised Porter for his delaying tactics.
- Continued his attempt to have the trial held in secret, even though any basis in concern for national security is no longer relevant, if it ever was.
- Tried to prevent an eminent lawyer from joining the case on Collaery's side.
- Screened documents before they could be provided to Collaery.

Spotlight on Aboriginal Issues: The Uluru Statement

On May 26, 2017 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander delegates presented the Uluru Statement from the Heart to the Australian people.

This followed 13 First Nations Regional Dialogues that deliberated on the proposals put forward by the Referendum Council and the four-day First Nations National Constitutional Convention at Uluru.

The Uluru Statement from the Heart represents a historic consensus of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in seeking constitutional change to enable a Voice to Parliament in the Constitution.

From the Heart is a campaign to engage Australians about why an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice to Parliament enabled by the Constitution is a fair and practical change, and how it will unify our nation. (Excerpts from Introduction of fromtheheart.com.au)

Project Compassion: Be More

If you'd like to find out more about where the Project Compassion money goes to, Caritas has put together a series of Lenten reflections, *Cry of the Poor*. Each week during Lent features a story that highlight the work of Caritas across the Indo-Pacific region. Coming sessions will feature stories from Tanzania, Indonesia and Bangladesh. If you can't make the Zoom sessions, videos can be downloaded from the Caritas website.

Last week Dave and I took part in the session featuring the Solomon Is. We heard about the plight of people with disabilities – the stigma of having a disability in Pacific countries. We heard Margaret's story of how she became a teacher at a school established by Caritas specifically to teach life skills to the deaf. We heard that the guiding principles of Caritas is to empower people to be self-sufficient. So often the starting point was to provide basic needs like fresh water and sanitation to try to improve health standards. Caritas – a worthy organisation needing our support!

WEEK 4: ARSAD, INDONESIA



Watch Arsad's film

Please watch this film prior to showing students, to ensure its suitability for your class. Note the term open defecation is used in the film but not in the written story.

If you did not have a toilet, where would you go? For Arsad, an Indonesian farmer, the idea of having a toilet and running water at home was a dream. Arsad and his family had to walk into the forest, to go to the toilet outside. When he realised that not having a toilet was making his family and community sick, he felt he needed to do something.



Arsad lives in Indonesia's Banten province. He lives with his parents, his wife and three children, aged 4, 17 and his 2D-year old daughter, her husband and their four-month old son.

Arsad is a rice farmer who also grows vegetables to feed his family. Arsad says. "It's hard to find another job to fulfil daily needs."

With no toilet in his house, Arsad and his family had to walk a long distance into the forest to go to the toilet. It was worse at night.

"We thought it was normal, even though we have to face our fear every time," says Kasniti, Arsad's wife.

Around 45 million of Indonesia's rural population, have to go to the toilet outdoors. Many are not aware that it can cause health problems and spread diseases. It can also cause diarrhoea, increasing the risk of malnutrition for children.

Arsad heard about hygiene and sanitation training run by Caritas Australia, through local partner, Laz Harfa. The Economic and Community-based Health Development Project encourages community members to work together to save money and build their own toilets. He learnt money management skills and became the leader of a local group.

The Caritas-supported project resulted in around 280 toilets being built.

"Most people at first did not understand about health. Now, they're willing to listen, and they have an easy way to build toilets," Arsad says. "We help each other."

Now, Arsad and his family are healthy. The community no longer has to go to the toilet in the field and has become happier. Arsad's part in helping has resulted in him being hailed a 'neighbourhood hero'.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Caritas Australia, with Laz Harfa, shared lifesaving messages on preventing the spread of coronavirus and distributed soap, masks and hygiene kits. They also set up a public rice barn where people could donate rice to share with other community members.

"Arsad set a good example and then slowly encouraged his neighbours to change for the better," said Imam Hidayat, Laz Harfa's Program Manager.

Arsad aspired to 'Be More' and in doing so, inspired his family and community to follow in his footsteps.

"Thank you so much, Caritas Australia," Arsad says. "I pray for the best for the Australians who have helped this program so there is progress in my community."
