World Refugee Week 2021

As we said in last weekend's bulletin, World Refugee Week this year extends from June 20 (World Refugee Day) to June 26.

World Refugee Week is Australia's main annual activity focussing on refugees, their situation, and also the positive contributions they have made to Australian Society.

So, at this time, we thought it appropriate to tell you about a few articles related to refugee situation that we have come across recently.

Firstly, congratulations to the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre on reaching its twentieth anniversary. It started on June 8, 2001 out of a shopfront in Footscray when Kon Karapanagiotidis and a group of TAFE students he was teaching started a community-funded food bank for people seeking asylum. From there it grew to the largest human rights organisation in Australia providing advocacy and support for people seeking asylum, via providing a health clinic, emergency accommodation, education and employment programs, and not least, legal representation, and support for people in detention.

As Kon says, when they started, the refugee issue wasn't the political weapon it is today. But by chance, a couple of months after they opened in 2001, "Tampa and Siev-X happened and the government announced that they would be the ones to decide 'who comes to Australia and the manner in which they come' and refused to let 354 refugees rescued at sea land in Australia. This was a moment this nation has never recovered from.




And for the last 20 years our government has been demonising and dehumanising people seeking asylum. The events of 2001 and subsequent years have been some of our darkest moments as a nation."

Secondly, and on a similar theme, there's an article this week in The Guardian about the two little girls from Biloela, one of whom is now very sick, who have been interned on Christmas Island for the last three years. In that time they have become inadvertent "poster children for the ills of Australia's refugee system." The whole world knows now that Australia is a very unwelcoming place for people seeking safety, and that we keep children in indefinite detention. In the circumstances the government might find it expedient to release Kopika, Tharnicaa and their parents into the community. But securing their release will do nothing for the other 30,000 asylum seekers living in limbo on an endless merry-go-round of temporary visas.

As The Guardian says: "Long-term policy will only be possible when the public begins to challenge the false narrative that underpins Australia's attitude to refugees that a group of asylum seekers had thrown a child overboard from a sea vessel as a ploy to force the Australian Navy to rescue them." This is the "founding untruth upon which the refugee detention system is designed that people arriving here by boat are so craven, so singularly focused on duping immigration officials that they are prepared to do anything to get in ...".

Until Australians reject this doctrine, there won't be any change. Even this week on ABC radio, Linda Reynolds, Minister for Government Services, referred to people coming to Australia seeking asylum as "illegals". They're not "Illegals"; they never have been "illegals", at least not since Australia signed the United Nations Refugee Convention in 1951. Yet this term now seems to have become entrenched in our understanding of the asylum seeker situation.

If you agree that the way we treat asylum seekers is wrong, or that the Biloela family should be released, or that as many as possible of those on temporary visas should be given permanent protection, contact your local federal member (for most of us this is Anthony Albanese) or the Minister for Home Affairs, Karen Andrews, or the **Immigration Minister, Alex Hawke. You don't have to say** much – just that you want better treatment for people seeking asylum, or that you want the Biloela family released.
